THE MUSIC STAND

Engaged Listening: Listening as an Event

n the 1700s and 1800s, part of the normal weekly affair was concertgoing - the actual attendance of and pure listening to live art music (aka 'classical music') as an event in and of itself. Young people met at concerts, the social elite mingled, politicians negotiated, and everyone *listened*. A weekend easily hosted four to five symphonies in a row, while many salons hosted chamber music in a more intimate setting. Live concert music and listening as an EVENT enticed the whole of society. Nowadays, art music competes with a plethora of other attractions from sporting events to media. As well, our visually-oriented and extremely fast-paced society draws fewer people to simply sit and listen.

Music is still present: we work to music, jog to music, study to music, dine

to music; however, in most cases the music itself is secondary, or background entertainment. Some of my students refer to art music in specific as 'elevator music', not in the sense that I remember the term connoting a negative description of boring, old-fashioned music, but simply as a fact: that is where they hear 'classical' music. A lot of young people simply are not exposed to art music, nor educated in the art of listening.

Art music is like a great novel and it begs – no, requires – our full attention. Imagine having Tolstoy's *War and Peace* at the dining table and casually opening it up to random spots throughout the meal, reading a sentence or two, and then continuing the conversation with your dining partner. The novel's content is entirely lost. One cannot authentically

For poster presenters selected, tables and easels will be provided. You must provide your own sturdy poster board. Posters should be no larger than 30" x 40" and fonts should be legible at a distance of 3'-4'.

Embracing Change as Professional Music Teachers



ecently, I was surprised to read the announcement that Nikki Chooi, the newest member of *Time for Three*, who only a few months ago replaced violinist Zachary De Pue, is leaving the trio for the position of concertmaster of the Metropolitan Opera. Knowing how much work it is to form a new ensemble team, my initial reaction was one of slight indignation, assuming a lack of

commitment and loyalty on Nikki's part. However, *Time for Three* posted a positive and enthusiastic response on their website at www.tf3.com, with the headline "*Time for Three* is excited to announce a new adventure."

Now that our new teaching year is underway, I am sure that each one of us has faced some type of change in our studio as well. Some of our best students may have moved, changed teachers, or quit taking lessons. New students have been added and new curriculum is being incorporated into lesson plans, such as CSMTA's new theory testing program, KITS, and new technology. (For me personally, it has been finally succumbing to giving up my flip phone for an iPhone and communicating with students more via text.)

For our new members who have either moved from another state or are new to MTNA, the changes can seem overwhelming at first. I have been an MTNA member in Iowa, Minnesota, and Colorado, and there was definitely a learning curve to each state organization. If you are new to MTNA and/or CSMTA, welcome! Oftentimes, there is the feeling that these students are almost like our own children, especially when they have studied with us for many years. However, I have never met a parent who made an arbitrary decision to change teachers without any rhyme or reason. Whether or not we agree with their decision, it is important that we respond as professionals to our students, parents, and colleagues. It is not an issue of compliance with the FTC, it is simply about accepting the change and moving forward with the terrific studio you have, and the opportunity to

be the best teacher that you can be for each of your students!

This year, I invite you to explore some type of change in your studio, such as having your students participate in a local association, CSMTA, or MTNA event that is new to you; providing a free concert for a retirement center or hospital; attending the CSMTA and/or MTNA conference and local association meetings; introducing new technology and new repertoire into your studio; mentoring a new member; or remodeling or rearranging your studio for a fresh look. Be open to the possibilities, and you will be inspired and refreshed as you embrace change!

ot much says summer like a trip to the weekly farmers' market! All things local, fresh, homegrown, and handmade – this is what we love and value in Colorado. The market brings out all kinds of people in the community and is the perfect marketing opportunity for goods and services. This summer, Foothills Music Teachers Association decided to capitalize on the foot traffic that occurs at the Four Seasons Farmers

& Artisans Market in Wheat Ridge by holding a performance event there on Saturday, August 27. Lorian Bartle, the Community Outreach Chair for FMTA, spearheaded the event.

When a former FMTA student approached the group in April with the idea of live performances at the market, FMTA leapt into action. Renting a booth was free, so all they needed was instruments, a sound system, and information ready for anyone interested in learning more. Teachers and students had the opportunity to interact personally with market-goers and share what FMTA is all about. Teachers could sign up for

30-minute slots and then fill that time however they wanted – they or their students could perform on any instrument in any style. Six teachers participated between 10am-1pm. One teacher loaned her keyboard for the event, and Lorian loaned her sound system for amplification.

When asked about the goal of the event, Lorian's response was, "Our goal in setting up an FMTA booth at the Farmers Market is twofold: to provide both students and teachers with a community-based performance opportunity, and to give the public the opportunity to get to know what FMTA has to offer for families and community members in experiencing the joy of making music."

Assuredly, many people who had never heard of FMTA got to experience up close what the association is all about, and students and teachers alike got a unique performance opportunity. Though summer is now over, just think of what your association could do next year! MTNA Certification

Certification is a process that validates an individual's qualifications for a specific field of professional practice. It signals a commitment to continued excellence in that practice. Certification increases visibility, builds credibility, provides a goal for professional achievement, and validates expertise.

Standard I: Professional Preparation

A. Knowing and Performing Music: Competent music teachers possess a significant understanding of and facility on their performing instrument(s). They demonstrate a specialized knowledge in a performance area as they provide students with comprehensive, sequential instruction. They have substantial knowledge of music theory, music history/literature, and pedagogy/teacher education.

B. Knowing and Understanding Students: Competent music teachers have knowledge and understanding of students'

physical, social and cognitive growth and past musical experiences. They assimilate this knowledge to develop a course of study and to prepare instruction that meets the needs of each student while cultivating positive and productive relationships.

Project #1: Write Your Teaching Philosophy – This can be easily accomplished in a week or less (2 days studying information provided, 1 day of writing, and 2-3 days of mulling it over and revising).

Let's Consider Mentoring

Greetings! Deborah Turnbull and I hope you'll take a moment to consider the health of our organization's most precious resource: our membership. Who are our members? More specifically, who are our leaders?

Look at the meeting regulars. We see those usual suspects who, in the fullness of their careers, work hard to sustain their local associations and lead our strong CSMTA. Yet we ask the question: Who will be our future leaders? To whom will we pass the baton?

Your local association might have seen a few new faces this fall. Maybe they need some special attention. What can the local association offer to them? What can our members offer to one another?

Master Classes: A Boon for Performers and Teachers

The *Oxford Dictionaries* define master class as "a class, especially in music, given by an expert to highly talented students." Usually the students are taught in front of an audience, sometimes quite large. A master teacher presents helpful insights related to performance, technique, and interpretation.

Most music teachers have attended master classes and many have entered students as performers. Why bother to attend or encourage students to participate? I believe there are multiple benefits for master class performers and attendees.

For Performers

The student gains performance experience before an audience as well as a lesson with an artist teacher. Initially he or she works hard toward the goal of being accepted to perform in the class. In addition to polishing the musical work, the young artist must be prepared to discuss questions about the composer and piece, including musical terms, structure, tonal relationships, composer's biographical information, and events surrounding the composition of the musical work. A vocalist is expected to know the translation of a song text in a foreign language, and the context of an aria. The musician must be prepared to start anywhere in the piece and adapt quickly to a different interpretation or technical approach. Humbly and graciously trying ideas with which the performer may disagree is a life skill worth acquiring!

Master class participants gain practice for competitions and auditions, experience in building confident stage presence, and additional resumé material. Exposure to a wider audience may result in potential performance opportunities, and college professors may want to recruit the student. It is an honor to be selected to perform in a master class!

For Teachers and Other Listeners

The master class audience benefits from another musician's expert eyes and ears. A clinician will often see and hear what a teacher may have overlooked. Be sure to consider, though, whether your student has enough command of the music to work on whatever aspect the clinician might cover.

Tip #1: Bring scores and take notes so that you can easily recall the interpretive details and apply them to other pieces. Consider organizing notes by historical period and composer.

Tip #2: Look for ways to enhance your own adjudication and critical thinking skills. Ask what you would say to the performer and compare that with the focus of the master class clinician. Do you agree or disagree with the solutions presented? Why or why not? It is an honor for your studio to be represented in a master class!

Locating Master Classes

Are you aware that many master classes are posted on YouTube? Some master classes presented by great performers from the past are available on CD or DVD. And don't neglect to check out master classes that are offered in local music stores and college or university music departments.

Attend master classes as often as you can. Encourage and prepare your students to audition to participate in the CSMTA Conference Master Classes held every year in early June. The application deadline for next year's Conference Master Classes is April 15, 2017. For more information, please visit the CSMTA website: www.comusicteachers.net/masterclass. MTNA Grants Available

Applications for Affiliate, Teacher, and Program Enrichment Grants are now available. Applications must be received by 3:00pm Eastern Time January 3, 2017, to be considered by the selection committees. All applications and supporting materials must be submitted online through the MTNA Foundation Fund website.

Program Enrichment Grants are provided to organizations seeking "seed funds" to assist with the creation of grant application materials that can lead to more funding from other organizations.

Teacher Enrichment Grants are provided to music teachers for private study, specific college-level course work, or other projects that will enhance the performing and teaching skills of the applicant.

Affiliate Matching Grants are available to MTNA-affiliated Local Associations and State Affiliates. These matching grants provide assistance for projects and programs that provide

professional and educational development, as well as promotion of music in the state and community.

Local Association Start-Up Grants are awarded to newly forming MTNA-affiliated local associations for projects that provide educational opportunities for students and teachers. Grants are also given for projects that support the promotion of music in the immediate community.

Of special note: The Loran Olsen Endowment provides grant funds for projects that pertain to the traditional music and/or dance of American subcultures including those of Canada and Mexico, and for projects that pertain to the expansion of knowledge of the traditional music and/or dance of other cultures worldwide.

Professional Reading Program: Inviting the Great Composers into Our Studios

As I begin to read *The Great Pianists*, the first book on our PRP list (and the longest!), I feel a bit anxious. Is this book too long? Will it be a good read? Will anyone but me read it? But I dig in hoping that the quote on the book's cover is true, and that it actually will be "a lively and amusing account of the personalities, methods,

technical peculiarities and musical genealogies of those who contributed to the art of piano playing." (It is!)

With pencil in hand I am making comments in the margin, which really do help me connect with the text. I write my observations in the margin: "awkward", referring to Bach's reliance on an old fingering of passing the third finger over the fourth finger...yikes! And "understatement!" as the author describes a concert given by 14-year-old Mozart, and calls him "the first of the great pianists in the world."

Another section reminded me of my pianist husband, who loves to improvise with diminished seventh arpeggios, as did many of the great classical composers, because they lie naturally in the hand and are easy to arpeggiate. My husband uses them in pop music or whatever!

And then I come to Beethoven! I am absolutely mesmerized by the stories of "the string snapper". One hilarious story was related by a man who was asked to turn pages for Beethoven while he played a Mozart concerto. You must read it for yourself!

My own connection with Beethoven came around the time I was reading this chapter. My husband and I went to Aspen for a weekend at the Aspen Music Festival and heard one of the most glorious concerts I have ever heard, there or anywhere else. Wu Han, piano, Philip Setzer, violin, and David Finckel, cello, played an evening recital of Beethoven piano trio sonatas that were absolutely spellbinding! The artists were so connected to this music and to each other in ensemble that all of us in the audience seemed to be transported into the world of Beethoven's "fiery expression" and his brilliance as a composer. There was something magical about that evening, so much so that my husband and I talked about it all the way home from Aspen – while we listened to music we had just downloaded: Beethoven: Complete Works for Piano and Cello by Wu Han and David Finckel – our own lives being connected through Beethoven's music.

Another conversation ensued a few weeks later as I went to our family reunion. I connected with my musician son-in-law as we discussed the intricacies of Beethoven and how immense this great composer's hold is on us.

As I continue to read and ponder Beethoven, I think of my students because who knows what each of them will become, where they will go with their music, and whether one of them might be a composer? I resolve to remember Beethoven and the potential of each of my students, and I resolve to honor them as if I knew that one of them might be "the next Beethoven."

I also resolve to allow myself to be carried away by these stories, to listen to great music, to tell my own stories of how I have been moved, and to connect Beethoven and the other great composers to my life today. I am thankful for Beethoven and my powerful connection to him through his music. As you read, may you, too, be transported and connected, have great conversations, and honor each student as having the potential of Beethoven.

Returning to our Professional Reading Program, have you thought about how you and your colleagues might be able to read all three books this year? It can be a dilemma, with all the teaching, lesson planning, reading professional periodicals, attending meetings, etc. Have you considered a PRP Book Club for your local association?

I was inspired as I spoke with Arlyce Black at our CSMTA conference in June. She has hosted a book club for teachers in her home for several years, and it has been very successful. They meet only three times during the nine-month school year and discuss one book at each meeting. It seems that keeping it simple is the key, and it only takes a few people to make it successful. And the connections with other teachers and conversations about the books will make them so much more meaningful, especially as we share ideas about taking the conversations into our studios.

Being in a book club helps me find time to read, and I even read more than the assigned books. Do you think this might work with our PRP books? I plan to try it, and I hope you will drop me a message (June@Ewell.com) to share how this is working for your MTA.

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Engaged Listening: Listening as an Event - CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1

engage in a story, bond with the idiosyncrasies of its characters, struggle through the conflicts and crises while celebrating their resolutions, without one's full attention on the story. It is the same with art music, which tells a story, whether through pure or programmatic style, in sound and through time. To get into the heart of the music, to understand and engage with its characters (themes), conflicts (development), and conclusions (resolutions), one's full, continued *conscious and deliberate* attention is mandatory.

Engaged listening expands the musical palette and stylistic understanding like nothing else, with a depth that rivals the efficacy of even the best pedagogue. For a pianist, explanations of the style and ethnic origins of a mazurka pale in comparison to sitting down and listening to Rubinstein's complete recordings; one is elevated from a sterile dictionary definition to an imaginative, living experience of the spirit of the genre. How better for an instrumentalist to apprehend declamation and cantabile style than to listen to a collection of lyrical arias? Chopin admonished that the most important aspect of creating an expressive melodic line was gained by *listening* to singers. Great pedagogues discuss the difficulty in teaching embellishment and ornamentation in Baroque masterworks by word of mouth; it is through *listening* that the art is truly ascertained.

The next challenge: helping the contemporary budding music student to sit and listen, just listen, to a piece of art music. Naturalists do continue to exist; however, by and large, an education in engaged listening is essential. World-class pianist and conductor Daniel Barenboim discusses this issue in a sixminute lecture uploaded to YouTube, "How to Listen to Music" (www.youtube.com/watch?v=LCKZDSIHV80). Barenboim discusses the many purposes music serves and the importance of completely giving oneself up to the music with no other distractions. The lecture serves as a great introduction to engaged listening, oftentimes inciting an "Aha!" moment that such an experience even exists: listening to a piece of art music without doing anything else? In working in my studio with students, I flash back to an advanced student struggling through her junior year of high school. After watching the video, I assigned her a short listening. As a Debussy fan, I thought she would enjoy Girl with the Flaxen Hair. It is beautiful, short, and, when played by Lang Lang, a truly theatrical experience (www.youtube. com/watch?v=jGSZPRk6aXA). I thought the visual experience would aid her in slowing down the pace of her life enough to fully lose herself in the experience. The next week at her lesson, she reported that the piece was beautiful; yet she experienced extreme difficulty in keeping her mind on the music. She kept thinking of all the things she could be doing instead of "just sitting and listening".

In an age when multi-sensory media is at a fingertip, when all things from interactive online textbooks, websites, and e-devices

to instant and constant social media dazzle with visual and aural effects, how do we as educators entice and lead students to the genuine thrill of art music? The education begins at any age with an introduction to the basic elements of music. Teaching students to understand melody vs. harmony, textures, genres, rhythm/meter, instrumentation and the specific timbre of each orchestral instrument, tone quality, key and modulation, and the various different musical ensembles (band, orchestra, choir, chamber group, etc.), provides them with a basic understanding of the ingredients of music. How can Debussy's revolutionary orchestral innovations found in his Prélude à l'après-midi d'un faune be fully appreciated if one is not familiar with the unique color and characteristic sound of the clarinet, the oboe, the bassoon, the harp? The acquisition of listening skills, however, is not to be done on paper or in a theory book - the learning is experiential, always through engaged listening.

Engaged listening can be taught in the general music room as easily as in the private music studio. For applied music teachers, time can be limited in the studio; however, a simple approach can take the same time as an explanation of a weekly theory assignment. Instead of discussing, for example, time signatures and the counting of eighth notes, pick a week to discuss one of the elements of music – and have a selection ready to share! By having a laptop or iPad ready, teachers can easily share links that students can access at home for engaged listening. I email the links to students the week I assign listening; with one click, they are able to access a host of great listening examples. Without exception, students enjoy the listening assignments – and the week without traditional theory!

Listening selections are ubiquitous and easily accessed by students of every age via online sources. Parents should be involved to assure Internet safety. When emailing links to all students, I email parents only, noting in the subject line, "For Johnny", keeping parents aware of listening assignments and encouraging them to monitor the student's Internet use. Oftentimes, parents participate in the assignment themselves, creating an engaged listening experience for the whole family.

When creating listening assignments, remember to make them relevant, especially when introducing students to art music of the eras. With a little creativity and research, teachers can set the groundwork for an authentic appreciation and intuitive understanding of various styles and genres at early ages. For example, at a lesson with an elementary-aged student, discuss a round, like "Row, Row, Row Your Boat", and if you have time, try to sing it. Explain that one of the world's greatest composers was a genius at making fancy rounds called *inventions*. Show the score to one of Bach's inventions demonstrating how the subjects imitate each other. Ask the student to listen to several links, one of a piano version of the invention, and then one of a modern

transcription for other instruments. I use Schiff's piano recording of Bach's *Invention No. 13 in A Minor* (www.youtube.com/watch?v=hPxs3np5oJo). After the piano rendition, the student listens to a guitar transcription performed by Dimitropoulos and Oikonomou in which the imitation is more readily followed by young listeners (www.youtube.com/watch?v=2Vd1jCeUywQ). For further enjoyment of the piece, I encourage the student to listen to Glenn Gould's version (www.youtube.com/watch?v=LgMkkR1iFYw). Interest is piqued by explaining how Gould often challenged the status quo and heralded authorities through his creative and unique versions of Bach's works – students enjoy stories of the rabble-rouser. Gould's version immediately evokes surprise and a genuine smile as the students literally catch their breath at the tempo alone!

Internet sources provide wonderful opportunities for engaged listening and visual learning paired together, another way to aid in bridging the gap from watching to pure listening. For example, pair the listening to a mazurka or a minuet with a second assignment of watching a video showcasing the dance itself. Students' imaginations readily engage in the creation of stately expression after viewing a real minuet danced in period dress.

A host of non-Internet-based resources exists for engaged listening and introductions to art music, such as CD/book collections including Schulman's Sergei Prokofiev's Peter and the Wolf, with a Fully-Orchestrated and Narrated CD, Prelutsky's The Carnival of the Animals (Book & CD), and Celenza's Saint-Saëns's Danse Macabre, to name just a few. The enticing audio CDs of the Classical Kids collection teach young students about the lives of various master composers while exposing them to a significant collection of their music. Titles in this collection include the famous Beethoven Lives Upstairs, Gershwin's Magic Key, Mozart's Magnificent Voyage, and many more.

Relevance, an important key to igniting a sincere interest in the art of pure listening, is brought to students through hands-on projects inspired by engaged listening experiences. For example, encourage younger students to listen to a piece such as Bach's *Toccata and Fugue* or Rimsky-Korsakov's *Flight of the Bumblebee* while having them draw a picture or design that *looks* like the piece *sounds*. Young students jump at such "theory" assignments. Challenge maturing students to listen to a piece

and create a graphic design of the main themes or sections of the piece. The *Finale* from *Symphony No. 7* by Beethoven, *Mambo* from *West Side Story* by Bernstein, the "*Surprise*" *Symphony* by Haydn, *The Sorcerer's Apprentice* by Dukas, and *Morning* from *Peer Gynt* by Grieg all ignite the imagination, serving as great starting points for creative ideas and fun listening assignments which can even culminate in detailed Achievement Day projects.

Maturing students enjoy bringing their own opinions and perspectives to the table. I like assigning, for example, a listening of two or three different recordings of a prelude by Chopin, Bach, or Debussy. I ask the students to express the concrete differences between the recordings, which recording they prefer, and why.

Deep thinkers find philosophical enquiries inspiring. While exploring potent early 20th-century music, it is intriguing to prompt a discussion on the importance of pleasure and appeal to the value of art and art music. Offer students a uniquely challenging modern piece while opening up a discussion as to the value of something that daringly tests our boundaries and limits. Is it valuable, and why?

When working in this vein with my students, I am continually shocked at the lack of listening skills with which they enter the experience, and the genuine enthusiasm, interest, and insights they bring to it. The experience opens up a new realm of musicianship that affects their music making and their understanding of art music, while birthing an appreciation that is beyond both. After three years of incorporating music appreciation and engaged listening in my studio, I am fervently convinced of its value and committed to sharing ideas for teaching engaged listening with other educators.

students. Group testing is conveniently offered at Rising Stars Festival locations in early Spring.

Beginning with the 2017 Spring season, CSMTA STA participating students will take tests provided by The Keynote Independent Theory Service (KITS). KITS offers new comprehensive tests each year that include Reading, Vocabulary, Listening, and Skills Performance. Complete information about KITS is found at www.keynotetheory.com. From that website teachers download an order form and mail it to KITS for manuals and student study materials following these guidelines:

- 1. Teachers determine student level with the KITS publication "Step by Step" Music Theory Curriculum. Seven levels, or "Steps", from Primary through Step 6 are described with reading, vocabulary, and skill performance requirements. A brief sampling of test questions at each of the seven Steps is given.
- 2. Students study and prepare for their individual Step with the KITS *Music Theory Workbook* publications. Each Steplevel workbook is ordered separately.
- 3. The KITS *Teacher Manual* is a complete guide to all sample tests with answer keys for Steps 1-6. Tests are based on musical knowledge, not age. They are

instrument-generic, and may be used for all instruments and voice. However, all tests use treble clef *and* bass clef. Skills Performance tests at each Step are adaptable for string, wind instrument, or vocal performance. CSMTA awards ribbons to students achieving test scores of 80-100%. 
